3rd. Sunday of Easter April 30, 2017

First Reading: Acts 2:14, 22-23

St. Peter preaches his first sermon to the Jews gathered in Jerusalem at Pentecost. He makes the accusation that they killed Jesus, but quickly adds that now we all live in the post-resurrection time. Belief in Jesus is the new way to establish a lifestyle.

Second Reading: I Peter 1:17-21

We continue reading Peter's letter. Here he tells his readers that their newfound intimacy with God the Father does not excuse any misconduct on their part. We have been ransomed by the Lamb's Blood, not with anything material.

Gospel: Luke 24:13-35

The inspiring Emmaus story, unique to Luke, embraces three themes of the whole gospel, namely: the journey, that faith is seeing, and that hospitality is important.

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

Today's Gospel story is a beautiful one, is it not? Yet, for all that, it is a strong reminder that faith has to grapple with new concepts of right living. One such concept I choose for us to reflect on is this matter of hospitality. Note how the two disciples offered it to Jesus when all three finished their seven mile walk to Emmaus. Not yet knowing who Jesus was, they still invited Him to "Stay with us." I can also imagine them arguing to Jesus: "It's late. Let's have supper together." "Together" is a significant word there.

Isolation, the opposite of together, has been described somewhere as "splendid". Obviously the speaker is giving praise to privacy. I, for one, must admit that I enjoy my "alone time." But being alone for a prolonged period is not healthy for us humans. Nor does it foster a vigorous faith life. Why is that? One spiritual writer answered that you and I are called to be "earthy mystics." He meant that we are meant to be in touch with others. Faith blossoms in a community. Even holy hermits are never totally alone, for they were with God in their caves and huts.

A community such as a parish has many benefits that we must not overlook. One of them is the realization of exactly who we are, and what our character is. We learn those answers to life's persistent questions in community and with the answers that our fellow Christians supply.

I read recently of a sad fact about the late comedian and actor Peter Sellers, of "Pink Panther" fame, who died fifteen years ago. He once said that he lacked a personality. "As far as I am aware, I'm nothing," he said. "I have no personality of my own whatsoever. I have no character to offer the public. I have nothing to project." In spite of his notable professional image on the screen, Sellers saw himself as a person without an identity of his own.

Jesus realized the value of community to prevent such thinking in bestowing on us a sense of our identity. He wanted us to gather to remember Him at least once a week. To come out of our rooms and hear His word to us. To leave our comfortable cocoons and feed our souls with the living Bread shared by the group. To receive the hospitality of the Church as well as to give it away to others.

Realize that your smiles and greetings in the church vestibule are a component of the Eucharistic celebration. Otherwise, people will not feel welcome. In addition, they will be deprived of a powerful help to realize their potential. In particular for this reflection, they will lose out on the discovery of what their special gifts bring to the group.

When we welcome one another, especially the stranger, we make it possible for them to "have their eyes opened" as did the two travelers to Emmaus that long ago day. They too will recognize Jesus "in the breaking of the bread." All because someone like you said to them, "Stay with us."
